Perception [Table p.3]

Levels of Culture

- Culture (Objective Culture) e.g. art, literature, drama, music, dance; social, economic, political, linguistic systems; history
- culture (subjective culture) = learned, shared patterns of beliefs, behaviors, values of groups of interacting people; everyday thinking and behavior; psychological features [Table p. 4]

Interculuralist Approach

Focus on how differences are likely to affect "face-to-face interaction" (Bennett 1998, p.9)

Cultural-General Skills – useful in many cross-cultural situations = cultural self-awareness, nonevaluative perception, cultural adaptation strategies, cross-cultural empathy [Table pp. 5, 6, 7]

Language

Function

- Tool for communication, system of representation for perception and thinking, guide to formation of concepts and categorization of objects, directs experience of "reality"
- Perceptual relativity

Non-Verbal Behavior

- <u>Components</u> voice, gestures, eye contact, spacing, touching, paralanguage -- pitch, stress, volume, speed [Table p. 8]
- <u>Ethnocentric Perception</u> Failure to observe intended cues, observe cue when none intended

Communication Styles

- Linear/Circular or contextual
- High Context/Low Context [Table p. 9]
- Male/Female [Table p. 10]

Values and Assumptions

• Within culture there is variety but one preferred, most common [Table pp. 11, 12, 13, 14]

Cultural Adaptation

- Assimilation resocialize, replace original [Table p. 15]
- Adaptation expansion, multicultural
- Cultural shock Euphoria of Contact, Confusion of Disintegration, Anger of Reintegration, Self-Assured Autonomy, Creativity of Independence
- Developmental Model of Intercultural Sensitivity (DMIS) [Tables pp. 16, 17, 18]

Denial – outsiders less than human; not recognized Defense – denigrate others

Minimization – try to bury difference, all alike

Acceptance – recognize and explore differences

Adaptation – shift frames of reference

Integration – multicultural
